

Raye Winch:

Today, we have the pleasure of speaking with Dante Celeiro, Executive Director of Fluxx Productions and a mover and a shaker in the Tucson LGBTQ community. Dante, thanks so much for being with us today.

Dante Celeiro:

Thanks for having me.

Raye:

You are involved in more projects than I can keep track of. Can you share what you're up to these days?

Dante:

All right. We're doing right now, School of Drag with MOCA. It's an intergenerational program where our youth and our elders come together and we, we teach each other about gender performance. Let's see, uh, oh my goodness. Housing, uh, going ahead and getting land and building communal spaces like where I live, we took the backyard with the help of course, of the owner of the actual property, uh, to build a communal bathroom and kitchen. And we have two micros now on the, on the property. So there's two people living here.

Raye:

Are you collaborating with any other groups?

Dante:

Yeah, actually there's a number of groups and one in particular has been with the Splinter Collective, uh, and then some other small, uh, underground groups and everything that are, they're doing some moving and shaking also.

Raye:

Where do you see the hope for being able to have people still survive and thrive and stay in Tucson and not get pushed out?

Dante:

There's a number of things. One in particular is land trusts, where if you, as you know, different people within your neighborhood or neighborhood association, you know, finding out the parcels what's available within your community, instead of going ahead and letting big builders come in and develop, the community, develops those parcels, which means we can provide sustainable housing. So that that's one way. Another way is, it's kind of like what we've done here. You know, there's the main house, but the yard is big enough. So let's build on, you know, whether

it's building on a duplex. It can be, again, these little micros and then there's the communal space. So right now this is a small scale, you know. For us, the hope is, though, to be able in the future to get more property. And even if it's, say an apartment complex, the point is is that we need more accessible housing.

Raye:

You've been doing this work for a long time. What keeps you going?

Dante:

It's the people. I mean, it's, you know, it's my community and I want to be a part of this community. And you know, I want to thrive just as much as they want to thrive. You know, I'm thinking about as I get older, you know, who is going to care for me? There's no way I would ever go into some sort of nursing home. That is, that's scary. I want to know, where am I going to go? What resources do I really have? And the reality is, I don't feel like those resources are available. So guess what? I'm going to work on creating it.

Raye:

What advice do you have for other activists?

Dante

First and foremost, to be a good activist or leader is, is to listen, to listen to what your community is saying, whether it's an individual or it's a group of people. It's definitely listening.

Raye:

I wanted to take a minute to give you a shout out. Rachel and I came to you with the idea for this project. You support us as a fiscal sponsor. I know you've done the same for the Sugar Hill Land Trust. Offering that behind the scenes, logistics support. Thank you. How can people support you?

Dante:

First and foremost, come to our events, uh, donate some time. It could be as easy as donating your house or land. Do you have any extra land lying around? Just sitting there, go for it. Why not?
